# **NARR Recovery Housing Levels**

## Level 1 (P): Peer-Run Residences

- Structure: Minimal structure, self-governed by residents.
- **Staffing:** No paid staff; residents hold each other accountable for house rules and recovery commitments.
- Services: Relies on peer support and community-based accountability for maintaining a substance-free environment.
- Who it's for: Individuals who are more mature, have established recovery stability, and are capable of self-regulation.
- **Example:** Oxford Houses.

### **Level 2 (M): Monitored Residences**

- Structure: Basic structure with a house manager or senior resident and house policies.
- Staffing: Has a paid house manager, though still with a focus on peer accountability.
- Services: Includes regular drug testing and peer accountability.
- Who it's for: Those who need more monitoring and structure than a Level 1 residence but are not yet ready for professional supervision.

## Level 3 (S): Supervised Residences

- Structure: More structured recovery support and life skills programs.
- Staffing: Employed, paid staff and professional clinicians are involved in delivering services.
- Services: Coordination with external treatment providers.
- Who it's for: Individuals who require professional guidance and more intensive recovery support.

#### **Level 4** © : Service Provider Residences

- **Structure:** Most structured and comprehensive level, often resembling inpatient treatment.
- Staffing: Managed by a licensed agency or substance use disorder provider with licensed clinical staff.
- **Services:** Offers in-house therapy, medical services, and a wide range of comprehensive support services.
- Who it's for: Individuals who are new to recovery and need the highest degree of support and clinical care.
